Starting with the main concept

What changes now is that all users not only will be able to participate, but also to build whatever they want inside of it, have true ownership of their data and share with each other the power to make this system functional.

Basically, this describes the concept of **blockchain** and, per extension, the **web3** itself.

So, if we are making a product inside of this new shared and people-driven world, how can we build something that is going to last without the core asset of it all: the people?

That's why communities matter so much on web3. They are the most valuable asset inside any project. They can build you up, promote you, sell and advocate your project for you.

It's almost like the **web3**, a complete technological improvement in modern society, is reminding us of the importance of sticking together and relying on each other with a strong human purpose to survive and to thrive.

That being said, here are some quick tips to build an awesome **community** around your project, regardless of what it is.

1. Who are you and what do you want?

It may seem like a rude question but it's not.

In order to build any kind of group revolving around something you have to know what this 'something' is, right?

So try to answer those questions:

– What are you building? (An art platform, a marketplace, a product, a DeFi platform, etc)

- What is your goal with this?
- Who is your ideal community member?
- What type of community are you trying to create?
- What is your experience in the field and what motivated you to do this?

Once you have those questions figured out, put them on paper – this can be the start of your whitepaper.

2. It's the web3, but we still need web2 tools

We are not completely independent from web2 since it is inside the latter that we are still using the most.

Of course, with time, we will use **web3** social media like it's nothing, but for now, communities are growing stronger inside the regular social media platforms. Some of the most used socials for web3 projects are:

- Reddit
- Discord
- Twitter

Those three platforms have a lot of **crypto and blockchain** enthusiasts that share their questions, their opinions and, yes, their communities amongst each other.

Of course, other socials also have a strong contribution for **web3** communities – and it will depend on your target audience – but to make your presence in the socials, regardless of which one, is extremely fundamental.

3. Provide true ownership & be transparent

For some, all this information above can be a little too much to display publicly. But not on web3.

You must remember that people will invest their time and – sometimes – their money in it. So, the more info you provide, the more trustworthy your project will seem to the community.

And even if your project does not work with tokens and other assets, or if it is a **DAO** focused on other purposes such as philanthropy and so on, try to make the members as involved as possible, providing cool exclusive contents, access to first-hand information, or any kind of benefits for those who are using and talking about it – in some way, they are working for the project's success just as you are, so it's good that they have some kind of exclusive insight.

4. Be original

This one is already embedded in the first topic but we have to go back to this so we can dive a little deeper.

Even though **web3** is still crawling, there are many projects being built inside of it – good ones and bad ones too.

The problem here is not so much the variety of cool ideas, it's more about separating the interesting and good potential ones from the others that can be just another copycat.

Therefore, try to be as original and as creative as you can be.

Bring fresh ideas and use that "early years" of web3 as an advantage for you to deploy something that has not been made yet.

So take advantage of it: be bold and don't be scared to try and fail. It's better to risk being original than to be known as "another one" in the crowd.

5. Start with your neighborhood (and with the world)!

Even though this is a tech world and you can pretty much do everything on your own, the affirmation "those who do not show up are not remembered" is pretty much true here.

Whether it is inside the "artificial squares" of the internet or at the physical ones of this big world, it is always good to talk to people, to understand what they are looking for and to share your ideas with them.

A good idea is to start with the people you know – friends, family, neighbors. People who you already feel comfortable talking to.

But then you can say "but my friends and family barely understand what this is!".

Well, this is good! To explain concepts of the web3 and about your project to different levels of knowledge can be hardcore training for you to convince different people to participate in your project's community.
